FFNC PROGRAM OCTOBER 9, 2020

OCEAN WAVES, Guest speaker Gerry Forney, FF Greater Denver

Gerry introduced us to the Kalmar Nyckel Tall Ship, a Dutch-built armed merchant ship that was famed for carrying Swedish settlers to North America in 1638 to establish the colony of New Sweden. It was sold to the Swedish navy in 1644, decommissioned in 1651, and sold into merchant service. It was sunk in 1652 by the British Navy while protecting Dutch fishing vessels in English territorial waters. A monument depicting the ship was erected in 1938 commemorating the 300th anniversary of the Swedish settlement.

Under the guidance and financial support of the Kalmar Nyckel Foundation, which was established in 1986, a replica of the Kalmar Nyckel was built and finally commissioned in 1998. Measuring 141' long, 25' wide and 105' tall, it is moored on the Christina River near the original 1638 Swedish settlers' landing site at Fort Christina near Wilmington, Delaware. Following a history of multiple prior ownerships, the ship sports the flags of the Dutch, Swedish, Finnish, USA and the state of Delaware. From May to October, the captains, mates, and volunteer crew host public sails throughout the Atlantic Seaboard. Additionally, the ship is used as an educational resource to engage area 5th graders in "hands-on" learning about the fascinating colonial and maritime history of the area. After training in the Education Center, the kids can move on-deck cannons, and help to haul lines. They learn about 17th century navigation tools and how they compare to today's methods. During the sailing season, the Kalmar Nyckel utilizes over 200 volunteers who all participate in multiple mandatory sessions on safety: firefighting, man overboard and abandon ship. Because it is a wooden ship, before each sail there's a fire drill. Every crew member gets an assignment on each sail: trainees, deckhands, climbers, and they learn about 12 different types of knot tying. Because

there are 4 masts and 2 cross pieces, there are 180 points where a line is tied to the ship. Crew members need to know which rope to loosen, haul on and tie down. The ship is operated and maintained by a volunteer staff, under the leadership of a paid captain, boatswain and chief mate. Generally, they sail with 15-20 crew members and around 45 guests. Gerry joined the sailing crew several years ago and goes to Delaware to volunteer annually. Additionally, in 2015 he became a member on the Foundation to help raise funds for the 1-million-dollar annual budget. Funding is provided by the state of Delaware, government grants, fundraisers, school programs and admissions on the sailing adventures.

Gerry shared that his parents, Bob and Marilyn Forney, were prolific model ship collectors, acquiring a wide variety of styles of model crafts on their trips around the world. The entire stunning collection of 72 ship models "Watercraft of the World" was donated to the Copeland Maritime Center at the Kalmar Nyckel Shipyard in Wilmington, Delaware and is available for public viewing.

FFNC PROGRAM NOVEMBER 13, 2020




Cathie McCallum had the program and presented a very informative and well-planned power point presentation about her early travels to conferences and experiences in the **Peace Corps** that created a desire to travel and learn about other cultures. She grew up in upstate New York, Saratoga Springs. Her first encounter to travel came when she left Long Island with its multiple driving lanes and rail-way tracks and went to Indiana and saw endless flat plains and hogs which was an eye opener to seeing a new landscape. This was followed by a conference in Miami Beach and student teaching in Montreal, Canada. She saw palm trees and long ocean beaches in Miami.

She headed to Quebec and found schools that were segregated by religion and language based which broadened her perspective of the world.

Cathie spent her college years in 1964-66 and graduate school 1966-67. She applied for the **Peace Corps** to serve in the Philippines and received an invitation to serve in Jamaica, West Indies in a new Ministry of Education program introducing Guidance Concepts in schools. Cathie had 3 friends who had a strong influence on her to continue in exploring experiences in Tanganyika 1962-64, Philippines 1965-67 and University of Denver and Morocco 1968. She lived with a family in Mexico to experience family life in another country.









She then went to Jamaica 90 miles south of Cuba and lived with two different Jamaican families the Dias and Genius Families. Jim McCallum and Cathie Schneider met during the orientation for Group 1X and were married 10 months later, June 1969, in Santa Cruz. Cathie's American and Jamaican parents came but Jim's parents were not able to be there.







Cathie was the counselor for all schools in St Elizabeth— 75 elementary schools, 1 coed High School, 1 boys boarding HS, 1 girls boarding HS, and 1 teacher's college. There were 120 students per class-room. Recess was time to use the outhouse and get a drink of water from a common holding tank. Housing ranged from wooden houses on stilts to wood slapped together with grass roofs to traditional looking ranch style homes. Once while driving she hit a mongoose.





Cathie and Jim adopted Cindy, the sixth child of the Dillion family, born in Jamaica in 1969. Eric was born in Kingston, Jamaica in 1970 and they were living in Guilderland Center, New York where daughter Heather was born in 1971 and in 1972-76, they moved across the country to Los Altos, California, then to Loveland, Colorado in 1976-86. When they moved to Fort Collins, Colorado in 1986, they traveled back to Jamaica so Cindy could meet her biological family.

It was back in Fort Collins when a friend invited her to a FFNC meeting where she heard about an upcoming exchange to New Zealand and she joined FFNC that very night. She now has friends on 6 different continents. Cathie invites us all to share how <u>we</u> got involved in travel.
